Jupiter

With the Greeks it is 'Zeus', with the Germans 'Donar'.

My Jupiter/Zeus stands on Mount Olympus, shrouded in clouds.

Zeus is the highest god on Olympus. He is also the god of fate. Zeus is the youngest son of Saturn/Chronos, who ate all his children. He was saved by a trick by his mother Rea. Zeus had numerous love affairs. He could change his appearance and mostly appeared in animal form (bull, swan, but also as a laburnum).

When he shakes his scepter, the earth, the sea and the starry sky tremble. In his right hand he holds lightning bolts. When enraged, he hurls them to the ground and rolls thunder after them.

He is generally responsible for the weather.

Although he is powerful, he has to submit to his daughters, the Moiren. Also the three Charids/Graces, grace and loveliness, beauty, joy and serenity are his daughters. In this figure they are at his feet.

Tin is assigned to it as a metal. The Zeus figure is 170cm high.
